Dear Teammates, Supporters, and Friends,

I am privileged to share the Navy SEAL Foundation's (NSF) 2024 Annual Report with you. With your trust and generosity this year, we provided more than \$32.4 million in direct programmatic support to the Naval Special Warfare (NSW) community. Every dollar helped us meet urgent needs, expand access to care, and stand alongside the warriors and families who serve our country at the highest level.

Through our Health Pillar, we saw extraordinary participation in the Warrior Fitness Program on both coasts. Operators and veterans reported life-changing outcomes in physical recovery, cognitive clarity, and emotional stability. We responded to mental health crises, supported substance use interventions, and provided care for traumatic brain injury. The impact was immediate and lasting.

We also invested deeply in our Resilience Pillar. We supported the families of multiple fallen warriors with immediate tragedy assistance and long-term aid. Our Gold Star and Surviving Families programs provided meaningful opportunities for connection and healing, including remembrance events, wellness weekends, teen adventure camps, and Discovery Grants for surviving children.

Through our Education Pillar, we awarded over 550 scholarships and grants. We supported everything from early childhood education to professional certifications and advanced degrees. When one of our active duty recipients faced a school policy that would have reduced his funding, our team intervened and helped reverse the decision. We do more than fund education. We do more than pay for education. We advocate for it.

Across the country, tens of thousands of supporters participated in fundraising events, athletic challenges, and grassroots campaigns. This year's momentum was inspiring, from the record-breaking Tampa Bay Frogman Swim to powerful Evenings of Tribute and national brand partnerships. The result was a record level of engagement and a deepening of our community's commitment to our mission.

In 2025, the NSF will celebrate its 25th anniversary. As we mark this milestone, we focus on honoring our legacy and building the future. Thank you for being a part of this mission. With your continued support, we will always be ready to serve.





PROGRAMMATIC IMPACT

In 2024, the NSF executed its mission with unwavering commitment, investing **\$32.4 million** in total programmatic support. We stood ready to meet the evolving needs of the NSW community through every stage of service, from initial training through transition and retirement. We stood by families facing loss, honored the legacy of the fallen, and ensured survivors had long-term support and connection. And we continued to be a reliable partner for every SEAL, SWCC, veteran, and family who asked us for help.

BUILDING STRENGTH AT EVERY STAGE

This year, we responded to hundreds of unique requests, including emergency childcare, respite travel, career transition assistance, and deployment-related morale events. These programs help NSW families stay resilient and connected, especially during periods of high operational tempo or personal hardship. We supported families navigating medical emergencies, helped operators return home during family crises, and funded gatherings that reinforced community bonds at remote duty stations, such as Kodiak and Guam. From command BBQs and spouse all-calls to leadership briefings and welcome-home events, these efforts made one thing clear: the NSF is here, every day, ready to serve when it matters most.

RESILIENCE IN THE FACE OF TRAGEDY

We provided over **\$5.3 million** in direct assistance to those dealing with injury, death, and trauma. We supported the families of warriors lost in combat, training, and in the line of duty, including SOC Christopher Chambers, SO1 Nathan Gage Ingram, GM1 Oscar Reynoso Ulloa, IT1 Kevin Etorma, and SN Tanner Merrill, ensuring their legacies endure and their loved ones never stand alone.

The NSF stood shoulder to shoulder with these families, from travel, lodging, and memorial coordination to grief counseling and remembrance initiatives. At our Los Angeles Evening of Tribute, Gold Star wife Megan Ernst delivered a powerful speech on how our programs have helped her and her children navigate life after loss. Her testimony reinforced the vital importance of our work.



All surviving children aged 21 and younger can receive the NSF's Discovery Grant annually, allowing them to pursue personal growth and purpose. One such grant enabled Grace Lewis, the daughter of SO1 Jason Lewis, to spend six weeks in Peru, learning Spanish and volunteering with orphaned children.

"This grant made it possible for me to explore a new culture, learn Spanish, and teach kids English. I'm incredibly grateful for this opportunity to grow during school."

We also hosted twenty-five surviving family members at the NYC

SEAL Swim and supported dozens more at remembrance weekends, Gold Star Peak climbs in Alaska, grief retreats, and memorial ceremonies around the country. These opportunities for healing are as vital as they are emotional, and we are proud to fund them with dignity and care.



A NEW STANDARD OF CARE

Our largest area of investment was health, with over **\$14.5 million** allocated toward the physical, mental, and cognitive well-being of SEALs, SWCCs, veterans, and families. This included support for catastrophic injuries, advanced brain health interventions, and trauma-informed mental health care.

The Warrior Fitness Program (WFP) supported over **320 active duty service members and veterans** at our East and West Coast locations, helping them address chronic pain, traumatic brain injury, post-traumatic stress, and performance decline. From functional neurology and mobility rehabilitation to peer huddles and coaching, the WFP has become a life-changing resource for many.



We also responded to crisis calls in real-time. We helped a veteran SEAL battling addiction receive treatment within ninety minutes of contact on Thanksgiving Day. We flew another SEAL recovering from training-related injuries home via private aircraft when commercial travel was not medically viable. These rapid, compassionate responses are what define the NSF's difference.

INVESTING IN FUTURE LEADERS

The NSF invested nearly \$3.1 million to empower NSW warriors, veterans, and their families through scholarships, grants, and development opportunities. Our support ranged from preschool tuition for families stationed at remote duty locations to higher education scholarships for those pursuing undergraduate, graduate, and professional



degrees. We awarded over **550 scholarships** this year across two competitive application cycles, with significant increases in both dependent and veteran applications.

In addition to direct scholarship funding, we advocated for recipients facing financial aid conflicts with their institutions, successfully reversing policy decisions to protect full access to educational benefits. We also funded licensing, entrance exams, and certification programs to assist warriors transitioning to civilian careers. This commitment to education ensures that every NSW family member, from young children to retiring operators, has the tools to thrive beyond their service.

"I am thrilled to share that after approximately ten years of rigorous studies, I have successfully graduated from medical school. I am truly grateful to you and the Navy SEAL Foundation for the unwavering support extended to me during these past few years. As we embark on a new journey to San Diego for my upcoming residency, we are filled with excitement to be closer to our loved ones on the West Coast. Once again, thank you wholeheartedly for your invaluable support."

FORGING UNBREAKABLE COMMUNITY BONDS

With \$4.6 million invested in bringing people together, it was a year of unparalleled connection. Over 10,000 community members engaged with us through camps, seasonal events, and legacy gatherings. Our Spring Fling series alone welcomed more than 3,000 participants across five global locations, from SeaWorld San Diego to the beaches of Hawaii. Princess and Her Frog dances in Coronado, Norfolk, Stennis, and Guam created magical moments for hundreds of fathers and daughters. Our Holiday Fests brought cheer to service members and children at remote duty stations like Germany, Alaska, and Guam. We also responded to unique regional needs, like providing vegetable-growing towers to families in Kodiak, Alaska, where harsh winters and food shortages make fresh produce scarce.



RESTORING LIVES, SUSTAINING READINESS, AND SERVING ALL

From emergency travel to Ukraine, where a deployed SEAL's father lay dying, to private school tuition for children with special needs, our support in 2024 was wide-reaching, personal, and urgent. We made space for joy and relief. We met warriors in crisis. We funded legacies and futures. We delivered on our promise: that no one in NSW would be left behind.


