Dear Teammates, Supporters, and Friends,

In 2000, a small group of Naval Special Warfare (NSW) veterans and spouses started what would become the Navy SEAL Foundation (NSF). They had no staff, programs, or national footprint. What they had was the conviction that the people behind the Trident deserved more. Twenty-five years later, that attitude is still at the heart of our organization.

This Annual Report tells the story of this year and what the 25 years leading up to it have built. In 2025, the NSF invested nearly \$32 million in programmatic support for the warriors, veterans, and families of NSW. We committed \$15 million to health, the largest investment in our history, reaching operators recovering from injury, illness, and the cumulative toll of a career at the edge of human performance. We responded to more than 1,000 requests for warrior and family care. We supported the loved ones of six fallen teammates and stood beside hundreds of Gold Star and Surviving Families (GSSF) through the year’s hardest moments. We earned a 17th consecutive four-star Charity Navigator rating, a 12th consecutive perfect score of 100, a 10th consecutive clean audit, and GuideStar Platinum Transparency status. Ninety-four cents of every dollar donated continues to fund current or future programs.

None of this happens without you. The NSF’s work belongs to every donor, partner, ambassador, advisor, board member, and staff member who has ever carried it forward. The threats facing our country will continue to evolve, and so will the needs of the NSW community during and after service. We will be ready because of your support.

Thanks for being with us as we mark 25 years and look toward what comes next.

MESSAGE FROM ROBIN KING

Dear Teammates, Supporters, and Friends,

It is my privilege to share the NSF's 2025 Annual Report with you. Every program this year addressed a real need of the NSW community while meeting the standard that has defined us for 25 years. Our scope is broader now, and the programs are sharper than they were when we began. What has stayed constant is the principle that started this work in 2000. No SEAL, Special Warfare Combat Crewman (SWCC), or family member should ever face a challenge alone.

The Warrior Fitness Program (WFP) continued to deliver life-changing outcomes for active duty operators and veterans on both coasts, addressing chronic pain, mental health issues, and other lasting effects of a career in the teams. We expanded access to brain health and trauma care for hundreds of service members, veterans, and dependents. We also co-founded the Veteran Alliance for Leadership, Outreach, and Recovery (VALOR) Coalition alongside the Wounded Warrior Project (WWP), the Green Beret Foundation (GBF), and Veterans Exploring Treatment Solutions (VETS), uniting leading veteran-serving organizations to advance research and assistance for those facing post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), traumatic brain injury (TBI), and other hidden wounds of war.

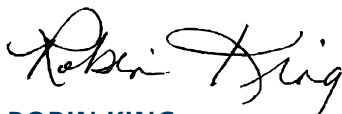
Our Education Pillar spanned every level of development, from preschool tuition for children at remote duty stations to scholarships, certifications, and licensing support for veterans launching second careers. We invested deeply in the daily life of the community through respite childcare, summer camps, Holiday Fests, our Spring Fling, command BBQs, and the gatherings that keep it connected from Stennis to Hawaii to Germany. We also piloted a new faith-based marriage retreat program for couples, bringing them together for chaplain-led time away from the demands of operational life.

We continued to stand beside GSSF through immediate loss and the long months and years that follow. We hosted families for remembrance weekends, wellness retreats, the annual Teen Camp in Hawaii, and Memorial Day events. We supported hundreds of family members, teammates, and friends at command and hometown memorials nationwide. This support does not end at the moment of loss. It extends into birthdays, graduations, and quiet weekends when the absence is loudest.

Thank you for the trust that made this year possible. We will continue to earn it.

The NSF began in 2000 with a handful of scholarships. In the 25 years since, we have grown into the largest nonprofit serving NSW, investing **more than \$225 million** in this community. We have stood beside hundreds of GSSF through the hardest moments of their lives. We have funded thousands of scholarships, tens of thousands of family connection points, and hundreds of thousands of childcare hours. We have built an unbroken run as a **four-star Charity Navigator charity since 2009** and a **perfect score of 100 for financial health, accountability, and transparency since 2014**. Our scope is larger, but our purpose hasn't changed.

This critical work is best understood through the stories of the people it touches under our four Pillars of Support: **Community, Health, Education, and Legacy**.

PILLARS OF SUPPORT

COMMUNITY

The bonds within NSW are forged through years of shared service and sacrifice, and the NSF's Community programs exist to keep those connections strong. We bring families together through seasonal gatherings and milestone celebrations. We create space for veterans to reconnect with former teammates. We give kids a week each summer to test themselves and build friendships. We provide parents the breathing room they need when demands become overwhelming. These programs reinforce the belonging and camaraderie that make this elite force the "teams."

FAMILY & COMMAND SUPPORT

We funded "Back In The Saddle" training for Ombudsmen and Family Readiness Group leaders, the people who hold the line at home while operators are away. We hosted spouse all-calls, Readiness for Special Operations Force Transition (R4ST) workshops, and the inaugural faith-based marriage retreats at Stennis and Kodiak. The year was also full of celebrations. Our Holiday Fests brought Santa to seven locations around the world, from Germany to Hawaii, and our Spring Fling at SeaWorld San Diego welcomed over 1,500 attendees for the Month of the Military Child. Spouse appreciation dinners, service member and son days, and Princess and Her Frog father-daughter dances all served the same purpose. These families work hard, and they deserve events like these.

RECONNECTS

Service builds bonds that last a lifetime, but retirement, distance, and the simple passage of time can stretch them thin. Reconnect events bring the community back together. We gathered veteran SEALs and SWCCs at Topgolf locations in Virginia Beach, Dallas, Austin, Denver, and Philadelphia, giving former teammates the chance to catch up over food, drinks, and a few swings. We hosted evenings at Bleu Frog Vineyards in DC, during SOF Week in Tampa, and in Hampton Roads, drawing hundreds of past and present operators and their spouses. Every gathering reminded the room that they are still part of something that does not end when the uniform comes off.

CAMPS

The children of NSW carry a kind of weight others their age never know, worrying about a father gone for months at a time and starting over at a new school every few years. Our summer camps give them a week just to be kids. We hosted 839 young people at 7 camps across 4 states. At Camp Virtus in Mammoth, they rock climbed and mountain biked while building leadership skills. At Camp KOA in Hawaii, they made friends and learned new skills. They met others who understand what it means to have a parent at the tip of the spear, and made memories that will outlast every deployment and PCS move.

RESPITE CHILDCARE

Respite childcare gives parents the time to recharge, manage daily responsibilities, attend medical appointments, and prioritize their own well-being. We delivered more than 25,000 hours of it to families across the globe this year, a 10 percent increase over 2024. Behind that number are real moments, like a spouse who finally made it to her own doctor's appointment or found a few quiet hours while her husband was deployed. It's the kind of program that rarely makes headlines, but it is precisely what keeps a family strong when one parent is carrying the household alone.

"This is phenomenal. Thank you for offering this. The NSW lifestyle can make a lot of mothers feel isolated and very cautious about who they let around their kids and home when their dad is far away. Littles are dealing with their own stress of missing their other caretaker, and bringing in someone new and unfamiliar can be so difficult. For the past three years, I've never used my respite hours because my son would panic if it were anyone but his nanny. It's incredible that you all are offering this program. Thank you."

PILLARS OF SUPPORT

HEALTH

Health was our largest area of investment in 2025, and our work spans the full arc of an operator's well-being. We help them recover from injuries and rebuild performance. We expand access to brain and behavioral treatment. We support families navigating serious illness, including those that come without warning. We stabilize veterans through hardship and connect them to longer-term care. This year's needs grew larger and more complex than ever, and the NSF was there to meet them.

WARRIOR FITNESS PROGRAM

The WFP is a four- to six-week initiative led by Virginia High Performance (VHP) that helps operators restore lasting physical and cognitive health through expert care in a supportive, team-based environment. We served 332 active duty and veteran participants across both coasts this year. The East Coast moved into a new building that expanded access to services, and the West Coast renovated the Warrior House to provide ADA-compliant lodging for out-of-town participants, welcoming its first attendee in July. For many operators, the program arrives at the exact moment they are deciding whether their body can still carry them through another chapter of service.



"This was one of the best and most impactful experiences I have ever had within NSW. In January, I submitted my retirement paperwork. With constant pain, poor sleep, and declining mental health, I no longer felt I could contribute on active duty. In the middle of my third week at VHP, I pulled back my retirement paperwork. This program has given me a second lease on life. Thank you all."

WOUNDED, ILL & INJURED

We stand beside operators and their families during serious illness or injury, providing resources that let them focus on healing rather than logistics. We fulfilled 630 Warrior Care Program support requests this year, providing recovery and adaptive equipment as well as travel to specialty medical centers. When a SWCC operator went into cardiac arrest after a training session, we coordinated flights for his parents and in-laws, housing for his wife and four children, respite childcare, meal cards, and a personal visit to Stennis with care packages. When an operator's infant was diagnosed with a rare condition requiring out-of-state treatment, we covered lodging and caregiver travel so that the family could stay focused on their child.

"I can't thank the NSF enough for its continuous support throughout the years. Over the last eleven years, I have had six surgeries. Ankle impacts, shoulder tears, hernias, and wrist tears have struck their vengeance upon me as I continue to support the NSW mission. The continued support with rehabilitation equipment from NSF has allowed me to recover faster from these injuries to continue enduring the grind of NSW life."

BRAIN & MENTAL HEALTH

We partner with world-class organizations to give operators and their families access to cutting-edge care that helps them heal and thrive. Through Home Base's Comprehensive Brain Health and Trauma Program, 32 operators received integrated diagnostic and treatment care spanning neurological, sleep, imaging, and specialty services. The Headstrong Project supported more than 160 service members, veterans, dependents, and surviving family members through evidence-based trauma therapy, and Military Art Psychotherapy reached 28 more. We also co-founded the VALOR Coalition alongside the WWP, the GBF, and VETS, uniting leading organizations to expand access to evidence-based care for TBI, PTSD, and other conditions.

CRISIS ASSISTANCE

We stand by operators during transition and unexpected hardship with timely grants and targeted resources. We supported six veterans through individualized inpatient substance use treatment and case management this year, including one who advocated to extend his stay an additional 45 days, which we were glad to fund. When a veteran diagnosed with stage four lung cancer needed a different climate for treatment, we helped his family relocate near a cancer center in Michigan. When another veteran's young daughter went into kidney failure after her first round of chemotherapy, we provided immediate financial support while the family found their footing. When the call comes, we answer it.



PILLARS OF SUPPORT

EDUCATION

Education is how this community builds the life it wants during service and after it, and the NSF exists to remove the financial barriers standing in the way. We fund degrees for operators, spouses, and their children. We cover the exams and test prep that make higher education possible. We pay for the certifications and licenses that translate military expertise into civilian credentials. And we make sure kids at remote duty stations get quality schooling no matter where the Navy sends their parents.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Our merit-based scholarships reduce the cost of higher education and vocational training for service members, veterans, spouses, and children. This year's recipients pursued their own degrees, launched new careers, headed to college straight out of high school, and returned to school after service. One veteran used his award to finish the post-bachelor coursework standing between him and medical school. Another operator's wife completed her master's degree while he went through the WFP. For many recipients, an NSF scholarship is the difference between a goal deferred and a goal reached, and it opens doors that stay open for the rest of their lives.



"I can't even begin to describe how much the Navy SEAL Foundation saved me during one of the most challenging times of my life. GRANTS

Our academic grants remove barriers that have nothing to do with ability. We fund private tuition, tutoring, and home-based learning for dependents at remote duty stations, where local school systems often fall below national standards and families have few alternatives. We also cover test preparation and exam fees for the GRE, MCAT, LSAT, and GMAT, opening the door to advanced degrees for operators and spouses who might otherwise be priced out before they ever apply. A grant is often the first step in a longer journey, and we make sure that first step is never what stops someone from pursuing what comes next.

TRANSITION ASSISTANCE

We equip service members and their families with the tools to navigate life beyond active duty with confidence and clarity, helping operators translate a career of service into their next chapter. Our partnership with Gratitude Initiative gives dependents hands-on college preparation, from essay review to admissions guidance to online test prep. One SEAL retiree watched his son raise his SAT score 60 points in three weeks and earn acceptance to every school he applied to. Transition is one of the hardest turns a military family makes, and no one should have to make it alone.

"The Navy SEAL Foundation's partnership with Gratitude Initiative has been a game-changer for our family. As parents going through the college admissions process for the first time, things can be overwhelming. The advisors helped us every step of the way, including reviewing essays and making suggestions regarding financial aid. CERTIFICATES & LICENSES

We fund professional certifications, licenses, and executive education that turn hard-won military experience into marketable civilian credentials. We support recipients across business, technology, healthcare, aviation, maritime, and the skilled trades. These awards run on their own timeline, and demand for them keeps climbing as operators think earlier and more seriously about the careers waiting on the other side of service. A certification can be the bridge between a specialized military skill set and a civilian employer who needs exactly that expertise, and we make sure the cost of that credential never stands in the way of the career it unlocks.

PILLARS OF SUPPORT

LEGACY

We honor the fallen and stand with the families they left behind. When a teammate is lost, the NSF is there within hours, and we stay for the rest of their lives. We walk with GSSF through the first unthinkable days and every anniversary, birthday, and hard afternoon that follows. We create space for them to heal alongside others who understand. We help their children carry their parent’s legacy forward. And we make sure their sacrifice is never forgotten.

SURVIVOR RETREATS

We offer GSSF the chance to heal and grow through wellness weekends and specialized camps, giving them space to step away, focus on recovery, and connect with others who understand. Our Winter Weekend Getaway on Amelia Island hosted 115 spouses and children for structured wellness sessions, family dinners, and the kind of connection that only comes from being surrounded by people who share the same loss. Over Memorial Day, our Remembrance Day and Wellness Weekend welcomed 275 family members, coordinated across every NSW command. And in Hawaii, our Teen Camp gave 20 grieving teens eight days of peer connection, fostering growth and resilience.

"We needed to get away, and this weekend was just what we needed. Meeting other Gold Star Families that were laying wreaths on their loved ones and hearing their stories, and being able to go to the White House. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

When a family loses everything, we make sure they do not also lose their footing. We provide long-term financial support to GSSF through weekly grief counseling, supplemental childcare, wellness stipends, home maintenance, and educational resources for children. This is the support that continues long after the memorial ends, in the ordinary months when the rest of the world has moved on and a surviving spouse is still figuring out how to carry it all alone. We stay in that gap for as long as it takes, because the loss does not end when the headlines do, and neither does our commitment.

RESILIENCY SUPPORT

We help the children and young adults of the fallen build the confidence and stability to move forward. By providing access to essential resources, we set them up to thrive academically and personally despite their loss. We provide laptops to surviving students so a lack of tools never stands between them and their education. We host command-engaged gatherings that keep families connected to the community their loved one served, reinforcing that they remain part of a network they can rely on for the long haul. Our goal is to give these kids every advantage we can.

HERITAGE PRESERVATION

We honor the sacrifice of the fallen by making sure their memories are preserved and their legacies endure. We provide GSSF with legal guidance, remembrance gifts such as flowers on significant dates, and support for the historic preservation projects that safeguard the community's heritage. This year, NSF staff joined families at Arlington National Cemetery for Wreaths Across America, placing wreaths, speaking names aloud, and honoring those whose families could not be there. Each holiday season, we ensure that every fallen NSW service member, whether laid to rest in a national cemetery or a private one, receives a wreath. We promise to never forget.

EVENTS

Across 2025, supporters found dozens of ways to stand with the NSW community. Some pulled on a wetsuit and swam through open water. Some laced up for Murph in the summer heat. Some put on black tie and filled a ballroom. From coast to coast, our events brought them together to take care of the people who protect this country and their families.

Our signature fundraising events and benefit dinners anchored the year, gathering donors in Naples, Houston, Dallas, New York, Chicago, Denver, Boston, and Los Angeles for remembrance, celebration, and generosity. First-year and returning host committees drove record engagement across every region. The evenings also became a stage for rare, high-caliber conversations. In New York, Palantir CEO and founder Dr. Alex Karp sat down with retired Rear Admiral Keith Davids for a fireside discussion. In Los Angeles, former National Security Advisor H.R. McMaster and Anduril founder Palmer Luckey closed the program in conversation.

On the water, our swims carried the community through Tampa, Boston, Annapolis, New York, and Charleston. New formats kept expanding the footprint as well, from the first Project 1 fitness event on Coronado Beach to a team of 15 former SEAL and SWCC operators competing in the United Heroes Veterans Hockey Showcase at the NHL Stadium Series.

Third-party fundraisers, hosted by supporters in their own communities, added to our total and carried the NSF's mission into new corners of the country. Golfers teed off in Newport Beach and Monterey. Shooters gathered in Nevada. Runners tackled Murph at Auburn University and in Virginia Beach.

Whether someone gives an evening, a morning, or a mile, there is a place for everyone in this work, helping to carry the load for the warriors and families who have carried so much for us.

OFFICIAL PARTNERS

Official Partners extend the NSF's reach and fund the programs that serve our warriors and families. They bring their platforms, customers, and creative energy to the mission, raising both visibility and resources across industries that span finance, fitness, defense, beverage, apparel, and beyond. Each gives back a portion of what it sells, turning everyday purchases into direct support for the community. In 2025, we welcomed several new partners and strengthened relationships with existing ones.

Outsider, an outdoor brand founded by a former Navy SEAL, came aboard with co-branded drinkware. Chevron returned as a partner and directed \$100,000 toward educational opportunities for the community. Born Primitive began work on a new NSF-branded training shoe, the first since the NSF's earlier Reebok collaboration, slated to launch in 2026. J. Mattingly 1845 continued its Trident Whiskey Series, releasing a limited-edition SEA, AIR & LAND collector's set. Luminox released its co-branded IGY6 "I Got Your 6" watch. Kill Cliff led a Fourth of July "Freedom" Giveaway that rallied gear and energy from across the partner roster, and Sunbelt Rentals provided the equipment, logistics, and financial support that made the New York City SEAL Swim possible.



PROGRAMMATIC PARTNERS

Some of the most important work the NSF does happens through others. We partner with established organizations that run proven, specialized programs in areas like career transition, mental health, brain injury, and family support.

These partnerships carry real weight. Through The Headstrong Project, operators, spouses, dependents, and GSSF connect with confidential, evidence-based therapy for the invisible wounds of service. Home Base delivers specialized treatment for TBI to active duty and veteran SEALs and SWCCs. And as a founding partner of The Honor Foundation, the NSF helps operators translate a career in the teams into a career beyond them.

Alongside these, the NSF partners with a broad network serving every corner of the community, from the Navy SEAL Museum and the UDT-SEAL Association preserving the legacy of the teams, to Gold Star Teen Adventures and other groups walking alongside surviving families.



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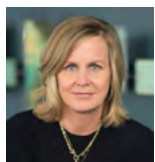

LOOKING AHEAD



Twenty-five years ago, the NSF was an idea around a kitchen table. Today it manages an over \$31 million programmatic operation with supporters nationwide. Since our founding, more than \$225 million has gone directly to this community, stewarded carefully by a small staff so the greatest possible share of every gift reaches the warriors and families who need it.

That focus has sharpened over two and a half decades. Each of our four pillars and the programs under them have been refined over time to meet the real, changing needs of those we serve, and the framework keeps getting tighter and stronger year after year.

We also keep looking for new ways to carry that mission further. In 2025, two of them helped us reach new audiences. On the X, our official podcast, launched in July 2024 and found its audience fast, featuring voices like Admiral William McRaven, Daniel Pink, Taya Kyle, and Ken Burns. We also teamed with MasterClass on a first-of-its-kind course on leadership and decision-making under pressure, taught by five retired SEALs, bringing hard-won lessons to people around the world who will never wear the Trident. That instruction is backed by a sacred ethos sworn to by those who do:

"In times of war or uncertainty there is a special breed of warrior ready to answer our Nation's call. Common citizens with uncommon desire to succeed. Forged by adversity, they stand alongside America's finest special operations forces to serve their country, the American people, and protect their way of life. I am that warrior."

For 25 years, a community has stood behind those warriors with that same spirit, and you are part of it. When you give and refuse to let these families shoulder the weight alone, you answer a call of your own. You are that warrior too.

We look to the next 25 years with real excitement. The needs will keep changing, and so will the ways we meet them, but the drive behind this work stays exactly what it has always been. Thank you for standing with us. Because of you, the work continues.
